

Farmers in Kenya grow coffee, tea and vegetables. Having green beans for tea? They might have come from Kenya.


And Kenya's farmers grow millions of roses – just in time for Valentine's Day!

Maasai people

The Maasai tribe of Kenya live in a traditional way. They look after herds of cows, goats and sheep. The Maasai move around to find land for their cattle to graze, rather than living in one place. One of Kenya's largest game reserves, the Maasai Mara, is named in honour of this tribe.





The tribal word 'mara' means 'spotted'. From a distance, this is what the savanna grassland looks like: spotted with trees.

Maasai people wear colourful clothing and jewellery.

Kenya's farms

Farmers in Kenya grow lots of coffee, tea, corn and potatoes. Having green beans for tea? They might have come from Kenya. And Kenya grows millions of roses – sending them off by plane in time for Valentine's Day!

But Kenya's farmers also benefit from the sunshine: some farmers use the power of the sun (solar power) to pump water to their crops.




